I recommend you purchase the bundled e-book and website access via Canvas for the best price. A two week free trial is available for those who are unsure about continuing in the class. Reading the book is not a substitute for watching the recorded lectures.

Learning Objectives:

- To be able to understand and use microeconomic terminology to solve problems on homework assignments and exams and as they apply to current events.
- To be able to understand and apply the idea that the highest valued alternative foregone is the opportunity cost of any decision
- To be able to understand and apply the idea that individuals and firms make themselves as well-off as possible in a world of scarcity
- To be able to understand and apply the idea that prices inform decisions about which goods and services are produced in a market economy and how those goods and services are allocated.
- To be able to understand and apply the idea that government policies and the organization of industries and market affect both production and allocation decisions.

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Lecture Recordings: The class is asynchronous and so the lectures will be provided via recordings. I will post four 30-50 minute videos (equivalent to two lectures per week) every week on Monday. You will be expected to the Smartbook assignments (mentioned below) before watching the lectures and a homework assignment based on these lectures will be due the following Tuesday. The lecture recordings can be found under the **Zoom** tab on Canvas and then clicking to **Cloud Recordings**. I will also post a link to the recordings under the corresponding module.

Quiz Sections: In addition to the lectures, the TA will post 2-3 brief recordings every Friday. Each recording will work through a key analytical question from the material that week.

Grading Policy:

Grades will be calculated based on the following:

- Homework Assignments (13%)
- Writing Assignments (10%)
- Exam 1 (30%)
- Exam 2 (40%)
- Smartbook (7%)

Note: Canvas will not round grades and I will not round grades for individual students.

Grades in this class will be curved so that the median student gets a grade point between 2.9 and 3.1 . As such, it is impossible to guarantee a particular grading scale for this class, as the median may be above or below what it was in the past. However, typically, we do not need to curve grades and often apply a standard conversion where 80-90% is a B+/- and 90-100% is an A+/-. I will try to give detailed information about the distribution of grades throughout the quarter, to try to help you understand how you are doing in the class.

Assignments:

- Smartbook: Smartbook reading reviews are due at 11:59 PM Pacific Time on Sundays. They are found in MH connect and typically available from the beginning of the quarter. Smartbook is graded on completion, not accuracy, but you may skip a few. You will be expected to complete the Smartbook assignments before watching the recorded lectures each week.
- Homework Assignments: Short problem sets are due in MH Connect at 11:59 PM Pacific Time every Tuesday night. These will be graded for correctness. You will get 2 attempts on each assignment and the best score will be considered for final grade. You will have one assignment per week except for the week of Exam 1 when you will have two assignments due. There will be no homework due the week following Exam 1.
- Writing Assignments: You will turn in two short writing assignments this quarter on 7th July, 2023 and 4th August, 2023. For each writing assignment, you will refer to a news article published since 20th June, 2023. Further guidance on the writing assignment can be found on Canvas.
- Exams: We will have 2 exams in this course. The first exam will be available from 13th July, 2023 and the second one will be available from 17th August, 2023. The second exam is not cumulative. Both the exams will be take home and you will be given a 72 hour window within which you have to start and finish the exam. You can start any time you want within that window but will have 80-110 minutes from your start time to finish. More details will follow closer to the time of the exam.

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Course Policy:

• Your 2 lowest homework scores and five lowest Smartbook scores will be dropped before your final grade is calculated. There is no other makeup policy for these assignments. In other words, if you are sick, traveling, or simply forget, you will not be given an extension for your homework or Smartbook. Instead you will be expected to use your dropped score. If you have technical issues with MH Connect, please contact their tech support ASAP (and do not wait for me to respond). Sometimes it takes time to resolve these issues, so please do not start the homework the night it is due.

- Given the nature of the take home exams, make ups will only be provided under emergency circumstances. Note: I do not consider work schedules, travel plans or time zone difficulties to be extreme circumstances and I reserve the right to drop your exam score if we are not able to schedule a makeup exam that works for both of us.
- Late submissions (up to 7 days) on writing assignments will come with a 5% per day penalty unless approved by me.

Attendance Policy: This is a fully asynchronous course and as such you are not required to attend any classes. All the lectures will be recorded, however, you should try to maintain a weekly schedule in watching the lectures so that you do not fall behind.
